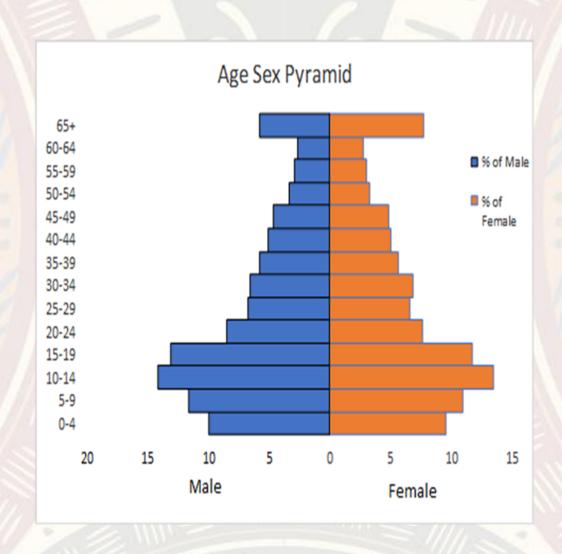
#### Introduction

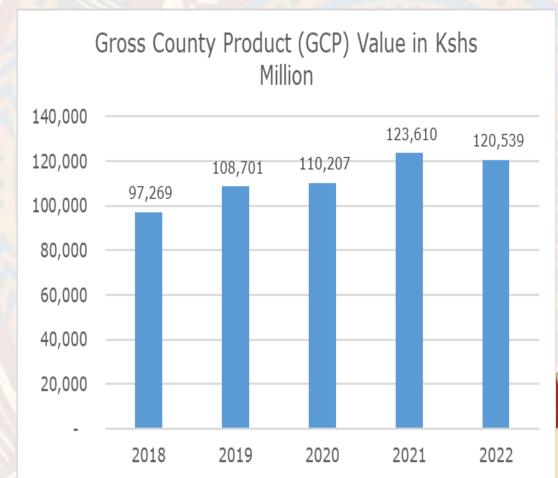
- I. Article 220(2)(a) of the Constitution state that National legislation shall prescribe the structure of the development plans and budgets of counties.
- 2. The County Government Act, 2012, obligates a county to prepare a 5-year County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP) with: clear goals and objectives; an implementation plan with clear outcomes; provisions for monitoring and evaluation; and, clear reporting mechanisms. [Section 108 (1)]
- 3. The Act further obligates a county government to plan for the county and that no public funds shall be appropriated outside a planning framework [Section 104(1)].

## County Socio-Economic Indicators

- 1. Overall poverty index 39.7% slightly higher than the national at 38.6% (Kenya Poverty Report, 2021)
- 2. Food poverty at 32% higher than national at 30.5%
- 3. The multidimensional poverty is 59.7% (national at 48.1%) which is 24 points higher than the monetary poverty rate.
- 4. The core drivers of the multidimensional poverty are water; nutrition; economic activities and education.
- 5. High dependency rates at 78%

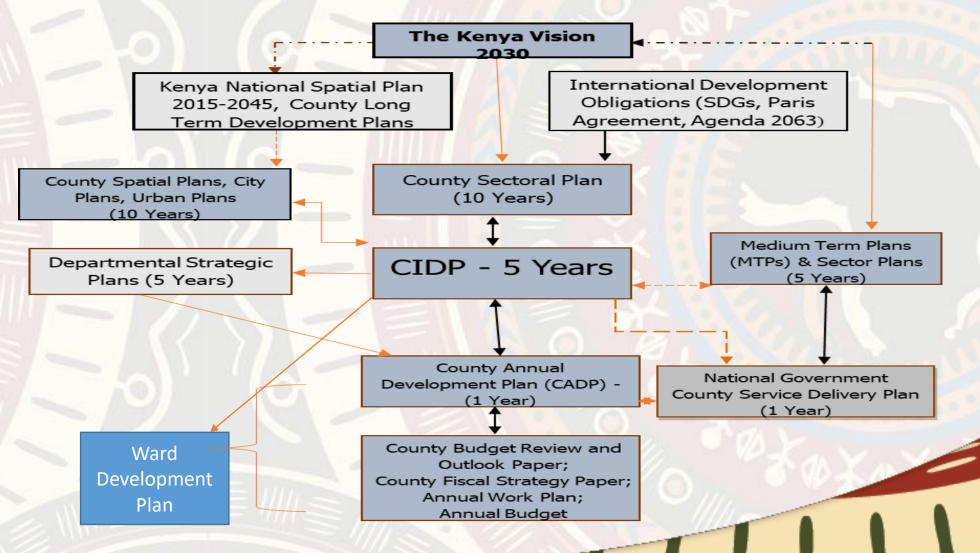
